PRESIDENT

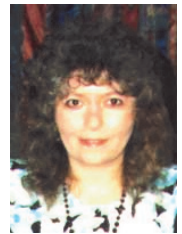
Professor Eugene Egger

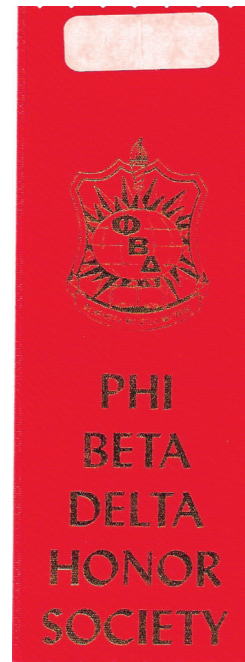

2007 Outstanding Faculty Award

Embracing Intercultural Competency: The 2007 Outstanding Faculty Award went to Professor Thomas Knutson of the California State University, Sacramento. Below are some remarks that the Sacramento State Bulletin had to say about Professor Knutson.

Through Knutson's dedicated efforts to provide a memorable work and study abroad experience, four Sacramento State students have spent the past year assisting in the English language program at Chitralada Royal Palace School in Bangkok, Thailand. And the rare experience has not gone unnoticed. Knutson recently received the 2007 Award for Outstanding Contributions to International Education from Phi Beta Delta, the honor society for international scholars. Knutson's activities to enable the University's students to study and

work abroad, as well as his research on rhetorical sensitivity and the role it plays in interpersonal communication between people from different cultures, were the key reasons he received the award.

In early 2006, Professor Knutson heard that the Royal Palace School needed English language teaching assistants. He enlisted the help and support of Professor Richard Adams of the English Department and, after a lot of paperwork and more than a few phone calls, they were able to secure four places for Sacramento State students at the royal school last May. "Chitralada officials had high praise and not a single complaint about our students," says Knutson. "It was a real tribute to the fine caliber of Sacramento State's students."

The Thai school, situated

within the grounds of the royal family's Bangkok residence, admits students from all walks of life and social levels. It has 1,700 students, ranging in age from elementary through high school. Before the students went to Thailand, they were required to enroll in a "pre-departure program" which familiarized them with Thai cultural values and effective interpersonal communication behaviors.

Knutson, who has had more than 100 articles published about interpersonal communication, had a wealth of knowledge to share with the departing students. "I wanted to impress strongly upon them the most important Thai value, social harmony," says Knutson. "Thais live in a collective, high-context culture and have

Report from the University of New Orleans

Below is a letter sent to Senior Vice President, Anita Gaines from Dinah Payne, JD, Professor of Management and Engineering Management, University of New Orleans. The letter outlines UNO's recovery from Hurricane Katrina.

We are pleased to report that the **Beta Lambda** chapter is doing very well here at the University of New Orleans!! The time since Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans and shut the City down has been fraught with many challenges, some very difficult and some really exciting. Our chapter decided to be proactive with some of the more exciting challenges the City and the University faced in recovery and rebuilding .

In pursuit of this resolve, we inducted a number of new members in the Fall, 2006 semester. We bestowed an Honorary Membership on H.E. Mahamoud Adam Bechir, Ambassador of Chad to the United States, The induction ceremony was one of the culminating events of the International Education Week. The Ambassador also attended "Celebrating Africa," a program sponsored by the African Student Association.

Additionally, this spring, 2007, in ongoing efforts to strengthen our goals of internationalizing our campus, a number of our numbers have been in-

involved in the University Strategic Planning Process. Our Chancellor, Timothy P. Ryan, has put a high priority on internationalization and designated a special committee to deal with those particular issues. Once the University Strategic Plan, with its internationalization component, is put into place, it is anticipated that our international initiatives will be more broadly recognized, and garner more support among all constituents in the University community.

At our first Spring meeting Chancellor Ryan spoke to the membership of our Zeta Iota chapter. His vision and goals include: empowering the members of the chapter by soliciting their input, increasing our international student enrollment beyond previous goals, a pledge for increased support of exchange opportunities for both students and faculty/staff, and the initiation of a fund-raising campaign to generate funds for an International

Because fundraising is the process of reaching your chapter's goals by having people reach, not necessarily into their pockets, but into their hearts, to give of their time and money for something they believe in – like international education – this article will share some ideas on sales and the annual reception!!!

Thanks again to Anita Gaines, University of Houston, who provided the ideas for the last article. This time I would like to feature a couple of great ideas from Monica Freeman, Omicron Chapter Coordinator, International Programs and Global Education at the California State University at Sacramento.

The Omicron Chapter for many years had a difficult time making ends meet.

They tried to use what funds they had effectively to sponsor receptions in honor of the International Research Scholars on campus, and to co-sponsor other international events on campus, but barely had enough funds to ensure they could hold a reception once a semester. As a staff member who manages many programs and projects for her university, Monica never felt she could find the time to do fundraising for the Omicron Chapter. The busy officers felt the same way. This should sound familiar to many

chapters.

Rethinking the Annual Initiation and Dinner: Typically Omicron had held their initiation ceremonies on campus in the afternoon around 3:00 p.m. There was no meal involved in the ceremony. Finally about 5 years ago they decided to tackle planning a dinner and initiation ceremony. They decided to hold the ceremony at a venue run by volunteers. All proceeds went to the Sacramento Children's Home.

By charging about \$8 per person more than the dinner actually costs, this allowed the chapter to do something positive for the community as well as raise some money for the Omicron Chapter. That marked the turning point of the chapter's budget. The dinner ceremonies always made a good profit, and the planning and organization was not overwhelming. By having the ceremony in the evening, initiates could bring their family members more easily!

International Cookbooks. Omicron is pursuing the idea of an international cookbook. They hope to have it ready for holiday sales in next year. The cookbook not only provides recipes from around the world, but also includes pictures, and personal stories from the recipe donors that teach about each country and give the dishes special meaning.

Travel Souvenir Sale. Another activity that brought in funds for Omicron for a specific purpose was the travel souvenirs sale. Omicron asks members to donate small items that they have from other countries, which Omicron then sells on campus

to raise money for study abroad scholarships. Some of the chapter members would have a table on campus to display the travel souvenirs and sell them. This event does not require a lot of time to plan and can be fun. Omicron tied the travel souvenir sale together with their study abroad fair in the fall as it will give added presence to Phi Beta Delta at an event great for recruiting future members! The most popular items were those sold on silent auction.

sen to make the trip. “Thailand is a remarkable place called the Land of Smile. Most people who have visited Thailand find that the experience changes their lives for good, forever,” he says. The Sacramento State students working as English assistants at the Chitralada Royal Palace School receive a monthly stipend, accommodations, round-trip airfare,

and college credits. “Most of all, they receive a life-changing experience,” Knutson says.

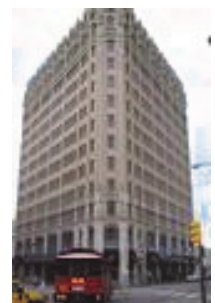
