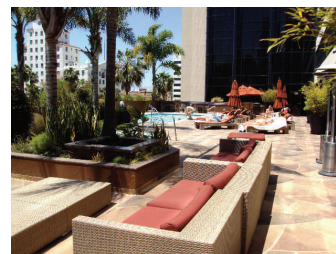

Phi Beta Delta Honor Society for International Scholars – Recognizing Achievement in International Education

In April of 2010, the Phi Beta Delta Honor Society for International Scholars held its twenty-fourth annual conference in Philadelphia. The two-day conference, which had as its theme, *Higher Education, Globalization and Internalization: Collaborating in Economically Challenging Times*, featured keynote addresses by Dr. William B. DeLauder, President Emeritus of Delaware State University who had also served as the executive director of the Abraham Lincoln Commission on Study Abroad, and Dr. Kenneth Curtis of California State University at Long Beach.

Faculty, staff and students representing Phi Beta Delta chapters from institutions all across the country joined with local and international chapters to listen to presentations, participate in panels, and to honor those who made outstanding contributions to the cause of international education. Among the award recipients was Cheyney University professor, Norma George, recognized for her work as the director of international programs at that institution for the past five years. She was also elected to serve as vice-president for the North-East region of the society. Every year, the Society presents the Outstanding Faculty Award, The Edward S. Blankenship Outstanding Staff Award, the Outstanding International Student Award and Outstanding Domestic Student Award at its annual conference.

Founded in 1986 at California State University, Long Beach, Phi Beta Delta has as its goal the recognition of the contributions of faculty, staff, and both international and domestic students engaged in activities and scholarly work with an international focus. There are many benefits to membership including scholarships, networking, and other opportunities for professional growth ranging from presentations at the annual conferences to publications. With over 10,000 members from close to two hundred four year colleges and universities, the Society also has chapters in Mexico, Canada and in Europe, and a strategic plan to expand its membership to every continent.

Now we look forward to The Society's twenty-fifth anniversary conference. This will take place in Long Beach California, home of its Alpha chapter, from Thursday, March 31 to Friday April 1, 2011. Induction 2010

Over 50 Oklahoma State University internationalists attended The Epsilon Upsilon Chapter of Phi Beta Delta held its annual induction on November 17, 2010 during International Education Week. The Chapter welcomed 18 new members and two honorary members into the prestigious honor society for international scholars. The chapter now numbers 239 members of which 28 are honorary. 2010 Phi Beta Delta student award winners, Michelle Black and Assa Kante, were recognized.

Dr. Estella Atekwana, SUN Chair, professor of Geology, and 2009 recipient of the OSU International Education Faculty Excellence Award, delivered the keynote address, *Breaking the Mold: Student Research in Sub Saharan Africa*. Dr. Atekwana was recognized for her international accomplishments and awarded honorary membership in Phi Beta Delta.

Provost Robert Sternberg also received honorary membership and gave closing remarks, outlining the benefits of international education, including the awareness that there is more than one right answer and that one can encounter unanticipated learning by sojourning abroad.

A reception and social gathering followed the induction.

CHAPTER COORDINATOR'S REPORT

The Epsilon Upsilon Chapter of Phi Beta Delta has now been established for six years, continuing to strive toward building a network of individuals with a common desire to promote international scholarship and cultural understanding.

This year, 2009-2010, the Chapter has been able to continue its award program to support student presentations on an international topic or at conferences with an international focus. Two \$200 scholarships were awarded to active student members of Phi Beta Delta. The students will be recognized at this spring 2010 Annual Meeting and will speak briefly at the fall 2010 induction.

The Chapter inducted 24 new members and 2 honorary members at the fall 2009 induction. Phi Beta Delta member, Dr. Barbara Stoecker, Professor of Nutritional Sciences and 2009 winner of the International Education Faculty Excellence Award was the keynote speaker. Her topic was the CAUSE program, the Consortium of African and US Educators that brings together faculty from OSU and Langston universities in

Oklahoma to cooperate with universities in Ethiopia and Kenya in capacity building.

The Chapter held a special induction following the March 23, 2010 General Meeting to formally induct Vice President for Student Affairs, Dr. Lee Bird and to confer honorary membership on newly appointed interim Associate Vice President for International Studies and Outreach, Dr. Mark Weiser.

To date, the Chapter has inducted 26 honorary members. Forty-nine members were considered active for 2009-2010 through renewal and new memberships. A card designed to post on a door or bulletin board is provided to active members as a means of identifying their Phi Beta Delta membership status.

The proposed amendment to require applicants for membership to be nominated by a Phi Beta Delta member was approved at the 2009 General Meeting. As a result, the names and e-mail addresses of local Phi Beta Delta members are now posted on the OSU Phi Beta Delta website at <http://pbd.okstate.edu>.

As we move into our seventh year, we hope to strengthen our Chapter through continued involvement in campus activities, greater visibility, and collaboration with other internationally affiliated or-

ganizations. The Chapter continues to sponsor for several International Student Organization events, including Mr. and Ms. International, International Expo, and International Cultural Night. The Board has been in communication with both the OU and the Langston University Phi Beta Delta chapters to explore areas of greater cooperation.

On behalf of the School of International Studies, I look forward to working closely with the new members of the Board of Directors as our chapter grows and evolves.

Gamma Upsilon Chapter, Ohio Northern University

The Phi Beta Delta International Forum is sponsored a panel of three ONU students/military veterans who served in Iraq and Afghanistan with multiple deployments in the years before coming to ONU. This PBD International Forum met on Thursday December 9, 2010. The title of the presentation was: "ONU Military Veterans Discuss Their Recent Middle East Deployments." Presented below are three very short summaries of the three veterans who presented.

Marcus Quinones- Married, father of three, Forensic Biology Major. Marcus began his service by joining the Marine Corp as an Infantryman. Because of his ability, Marcus was also asked to join an elite unit within the Marine Corp called the Scout Swimmers. He deployed to Iraq with the Marines. After returning home, he decided to allow his contract to expire due to the birth of his son. However, mere months

after returning to civilian life, Marcus realized it was not for him and thus he decided to join the Army where he could retain the rank that he held in the Marine Corp. He redeployed to Iraq with the Army after being sent to his new unit. During this deployment, an enemy explosive hit Marcus and caused severe damage to his leg and knee. After returning from Iraq, he was medically discharged from the Army due to his wounds.

Bradley Nungester- Divorced, no children, Criminal Justice Major. Bradley began his service by joining the Army as an Infantryman. He received orders to be assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division and then deployed with this unit to Iraq in late 2006 to early 2007. One day in Baghdad, Iraq, Bradley's unit was conducting a mounted vehicular patrol when the patrol was forced to stop. He exited his vehicle and was immediately shot in the chest 3 times by

an enemy sniper. Luckily, lethal damage was avoided due to his body armor. However, he did suffer several broken ribs. Later, Bradley suffered a series of heart attacks. It is not known whether a correlation existed between his being shot and the heart attacks as he may have suffered from a preexisting genetic condition. The heart condition led to Bradley being medically discharged from the Army.

Brandon J. Bryant- Single, no children, Political Science/International Studies Majors. He began his career by joining the Army as an Airborne Infantryman. After graduating from Advanced Infantry Training at Ft. Benning, GA, he went on to Airborne School and graduated as a paratrooper. He was then assigned to the 1st of the 501st Parachute Infantry Regiment in Ft. Richardson, Alaska. From there his unit deployed to Afghanistan in October of 2003. After returning home in August of

2004, he was reassigned to Ft. Hood, TX where his new unit, the 1st Battalion of the 22nd Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division was deployed to Iraq in December of 2005 and returned home in December of 2006. He was honorably discharged from active service in March of 2007.

All of the veterans above in addition to receiving the Purple Heart for wounds received in combat, ended their military careers as highly decorated veterans.
