## HISTORY OF PHI BETA DELTA

In 1985, the Center for International Education (CIE) at California State University, Long Beach (CSULB) wanted to recognize formally the academic achievement of international students, U.S. students returning from study overseas, international scholars, staff involved in international education, and faculty engaged in scholarly international endeavors. The CIE staff examined the described activities of existing national honor societies and found none which appropriately addressed these populations, or specifically focused on the international experience. Therefore, a campus committee was formed to develop an honor society which would focus on international education and exchange, and also serve as a catalyst for international programming.

As a result of numerous meetings, the committee, which was headed by Edward S. Blankenship, Director of CIE, and Karl W.E. Anatol, Dean of Humanities, recommended the formation of an honor society at CSULB that would recognize individuals who have demonstrated scholarly achievement in the international arena. Those identified for membership included:

1. international students (juniors, seniors and graduate students) who had demonstrated high scholastic achievement;
2. students who had completed studies abroad in approved exchange programs, and had demonstrated high scholastic achievement;
3. international visiting scholars; and
4. U.S. faculty and staff who had been involved in recognized international endeavors, (i.e., research, teaching, program development, and international educational exchange).

The name of the organization, Phi Beta Delta, was selected by the Organizing Committee. The Greek letters stand for the following:

- ✦ Phi (philomatheia) - love of knowledge;
- ✦ Beta (biotremmonia) - valuing of human life; and
- ✦ Delta (diapheren) - achieving excellence.

The colors chosen for the honor society were red and gold. Red symbolizes the strength and diversity of humankind and gold is a symbol for the sun from which all people and cultures draw strength and life.

The crest of the Society was designed with a globe, a torch, the sun, a book, and a shield. The *globe* represents the international perspective of the Society's members. The *torch* symbolizes the leadership and influence of the Society. The *sun* stands for the energy from which all cultures draw strength. The *book* symbolizes the coining and sharing of knowledge. The *shield* represents the preservation of academic freedom. The Society's motto -- *Scientia Mutua Mundi* (World's Shared Knowledge) -- is inscribed at the base of the crest.

On February 27, 1986 Phi Beta Delta Honor Society for International Scholars was founded on the campus of California State University-Long Beach. As a result of the enthusiasm of the new members of this honor society and of the University administration, several other universities heard of the forming of Phi Beta Delta and became interested in forming chapters on their campuses. Although it was not in the original plan to consider the development of a national honor society, Drs. Blankenship and Anatol realized from the requests and interest of individuals at other institutions that this organization would be a valuable asset to other campuses. Therefore, the Organizing Committee at CSULB went back to work and investigated methods for forming a national honor society.

After much research and discussion, it was decided that the chapter at Long Beach would be designated as the Alpha Chapter. The Alpha Chapter then invited a number of institutions throughout the U.S. to consider forming chapters. The end result was that 38 institutions were authorized by the Alpha Chapter to form charter chapters (see list on page 12).

On May 22, 1987, the chapter coordinators from these institutions met in Long Beach, California to establish Phi Beta Delta as a national honor society. At this first historic meeting of the founders of Phi Beta Delta, Edward Blankenship and Karl Anatol of the Alpha Chapter presented an overview of the Society and its founding at CSU-Long Beach, discussed its present status, and outlined future directions for the national organization. The first Society Medallion was presented to Richard Downie, founding member of the Pi Chapter at the University of Florida and President of NAFSA: Association for International Educators. Dr. Downie was later elected as the first president of Phi Beta Delta.

In order to recognize scholarly achievement and leadership in international education and exchange, delegates at the first meeting decided that this new Society would publish a refereed journal, organize annual national conferences, and recognize outstanding individuals through scholarships and awards. Other key decisions and actions taken at the Society's first national conference included:

- ✦ the establishment of the Society's National Office at CSULB;
- ✦ the adoption of national by-laws;
- ✦ the development of a chapter manual;
- ✦ the assessment of \$ 1.00 per member to provide funds to establish the national office;
- ✦ the empowerment of the Board to proceed with the incorporation of the Society;
- ✦ the selection of Washington, D.C. as the site of the Second Annual National Conference; and
- ✦ the election and appointment of the following individuals to serve as the first Board of Directors:

Subsequent meetings of the Board of Directors (two per year) assured continued growth and development of the Society. A chronological summary of important decisions and activities follows as reported in the minutes of the various board meetings.

October, 1987

- ✦ Twenty-one of the 38 chartered chapters had been founded.
- ✦ An initiation fee of \$ 18. was approved by the Board.
- ✦ Annual national dues were set at \$ 12.
- ✦ Non-U.S. institutions would be allowed to join the Society by invitation from the Board.
- ✦ National faculty award and student scholarships were established.
- ✦ The annual operating budget of \$ 25,000. was approved.

- ✦ The Second Annual National Conference was held in Washington, D.C., May 26 and 27, 1988 at the Washington Sheraton Hotel.
- ✦ Dr. James B. Meriwether, Past Chair of the Board of Foreign Scholarships and Professor of English at the University of South Carolina, gave the Keynote Address.
- ✦ Eight new chapters received their charters, bringing the total number of chapters to 46.
- ✦ There were 1,675 active members.
- ✦ The National Office was directed to proceed with incorporation, obtaining tax exempt status, and copyrighting the name of the Society.
- ✦ Dr. Francille M. Firebaugh, Vice Provost for International Affairs and Professor of Human Ecology from The Ohio State University, received the first National Faculty Award.
- ✦ Mr. Kikaya bin Karubi, Boston University, and Ms. Francine Slaton, University of Southwestern Louisiana, won the first National Student Scholarships.
- ✦ The Tau Chapter at The University of Georgia won the first National Outstanding Chapter Award.

- ✦ The first edition of "The Medallion", the Society newsletter, was published.
- ✦ "News and Notes" was established as a means for the President to communicate with Chapter Coordinators and members.
- ✦ The Society's medallion was adopted as the official induction emblem for all chapters.
- ✦ The Society's journal was named the Phi Beta Delta International Review.
- ✦ The National Book Award was established.
- ✦ All board appointments, except for executive director, were limited to three years.
